Spiritual but Not Religious

The phrase that people often use today to shut anyone up who asks them about their church membership, denomination or worship life is "I'm spiritual but not religious." It sounds kinda good doesn't it? It's usually a conversation stopper.

This con-out phrase fits into the same

This cop-out phrase fits into the same category with "My truth" instead of "The Truth" and "My faith is a matter between God and me." It sounds somewhat mysterious, as if the person has some secret, personal knowledge that no one else has. I would agree with at least part of it because all of us are truly spiritual beings. Everyone on earth has an immortal soul which makes us all "spiritual," and it is also true that many are not "religious."

I recently found a term that describes home-made religions. The term is "Sheilaism." The term was coined from a woman named Sheila Larson, who is quoted by Robert Bellah and Richard Madsen in their book *Habits of the Heart* (1985) as "following her own little voice" in a belief system she calls "Sheilaism."

There are many problems with home-made religions even if they don't call them religions.

1. Which God are they talking about? Are they talking about the "she" god of many liberal Christian churches? One of the many gods of the Hindus? Satan?

Maybe some good questions might be "How many gods are there to choose from?" "Can a human being create a god or is it a god who created us?" or "Isn't everything in the universe just a gigantic accident?" So which God are they referring to?

2. If I believe something, does that make it true? For instance, if I believe that I have hair like

Elvis does that make it true? If I believe the earth is flat does that mean it's true, or is it just true for me? If I don't believe in gravity does that mean I am able

to fly? You get the point – just believing something doesn't automatically make it a scientific or theological fact.

3. Is there any outside (other than my own thoughts) evidence for my belief? For decades people have been searching for the Loch Ness monster, tracking Bigfoot, and trying to photograph UFOs.

Every year a new batch of "evidence" and television documentaries appear. In spite of all the "questionable evidence" and tens of thousands of believers, there is no hard evidence for any of these popular myths. For people who have created their own Sheilaism there is even less "evidence," only what people have made up and call their "religion."

I understand why people are averse to "religion." Jesus was against "religion" too, and so were the prophets of the Old Testament. Too often "religious" means just going through the motions, following dead rituals, or mindless worship. That's no

more true religion than shooting baskets is a real ball game.

Christianity is not based upon human fantasy, made up rituals, or just "belief." It is historical. It is time-tested. It is based upon God's revealed Word rather than human ideas. It's not Sheilaism in any sense of the word. Christianity is for those who want to know the one and only real God. It is for those who know that we are all sinners and need salvation. It is for those who believe and trust in God's Son who died that we might live. Christianity is much more than a system of belief, it is a lifestyle.


Let Us Pray for One Another:


